Computer Project Work Requirements

On Achievement Day, Computer members will be required to display three (3) projects, having no more than two (2) entries from any one section of the Computer class list.

4-H Nova Scotia Provincial Show Class & Sections:

Each county is eligible to send the top two (2) junior and top two (2) senior articles to the 4-H Nova Scotia Provincial Show. The sections are as follows:

Class 18: Computer

Section 1:	Word Processing, Presentations, Spreadsheets - document, letter, report, greeting cards, brochure, newsletter, resume, storybook, poster, etc. <i>Spreadsheets and Databases</i> - spreadsheets showing formulas and finished result, database and resulting report, etc. Presentations (slide show, etc.)
Section 2:	App and Program Design and Programming, Databases
Section 3:	Webpages Design and Development - web pages including a copy of source code
Section 4:	Computer Builds, Rebuilds and Parts Display
Section 5:	Posters, Reports – related to any computer-related topic
Section 6:	Specialty Items (Not included in any other category)
Section 7:	Graphic Design, Animation, Production, Editing

***Suggestion:** Reports should be a minimum of 1 page in length (approx. 250 words) and should include diagrams and/or photos where possible.*

All members should review Units 1 and 2 at the beginning of the year. After that, members can learn about the topics in the other units that are appropriate to their knowledge level. Members do NOT have to cover all topics in one year. The number and type of topics chosen each year should reflect the member's current level of knowledge. (e.g., new computer users may spend their first year in the first three units, while a more knowledgeable member may cover several of the advanced topics in a year).

Note: All reports, posters or displays must include a bibliography for information taken from a source other than the 4-H member. For example, should a member utilize information or pictures from a reference book or from the internet, then the member must include credit for the source of the information.

Note: Web pages and programming projects should include a copy of source code as well as the finished product.

Note: If modified graphics are exhibited, both the original and the modified/enhanced graphics must be shown.

Note: Members requiring a computer to display their work at any level are responsible for bringing a computer and appropriate power bars, extension cords, etc.

Note: If members require video/slide equipment to display their project, specialty item or project activity, they must provide their own equipment at Achievement Day, Exhibition and 4-H Nova Scotia Provincial Show.
